**COOL is an interdenominational youth work project, which has employed a full time youth and schools' worker in partnership with Scripture Union Scotland (SU) through the Associate Worker Scheme. The objects of the Trust, as set out in the constitution, are to encourage and support the young people of Lochalsh and the surrounding area, helping them to establish and strengthen their relationship with God and provide social and recreational opportunities.**



Established in March 2001, COOL has employed Dave Mockett as a full time youth and schools' worker since November 2001. He is married to Ruth and they have two children; Joshua and Keziah. Following his BSc and Masters, Dave gained a teaching certificate and had

three years experience as a paid youth worker before being employed by COOL.

Working in the Western Highlands of Scotland, covering a geographical area of approximately 300 square miles, Dave travels about ten thousand miles each year as his work takes him into the eleven primary schools and the high school in the area. Out of school work involves leading youth groups, holiday clubs and weekends away, and training and supporting volunteer youth leaders.

Dave is supported in his work for COOL by the management committee, local church leaders and youth leaders. His work is greatly valued and appreciated by the head teachers of both the secondary and primary schools who also offer support and encouragement. As an SU Associate Worker, Dave is also supported nationally by SU's extensive network of

schools workers. The SU Associate Worker Scheme gives training, development and management support to the committee and supervisory line management sessions for Dave. Day to day line management is provided through monthly meetings with Malcolm Gardiner, chairman of the Trust.

## YEAR SEVEN OF YOUTH WORKER'S WORK



Now that we are in year seven of the youth worker's employment it means that an entire group of young people have been followed through from S1 to S6

and that Dave's work is now very much an accepted part of the scene in Plockton High School and its feeder primaries. The majority of primary children now know Dave very well before they come up to secondary, not only through school assemblies but also through the various summer holiday clubs held in partnership with the churches. We are very encouraged by the way Dave continues to be well received by both schools and local churches.

### *HIGH SCHOOL*

Having taken six-weeks sick leave at the start of the year, Dave was much heartened by the warm welcome he received from both pupils and staff on his return in mid March. Due to the good relationships previously developed the regular programme was soon able to get under way again. Time is spent in the High School nearly every Wednesday and Friday both informally and in more formal situations, often leading assemblies as part of the Christian Support Team. Visits to the Plockton school hostel continue on Wednesday evenings.

In September Dave met with the headteacher and some others from the chaplaincy team to plan out the religious observance programme for the school session. Regular assemblies continue to take place co-ordinated by Dave and the Head. It is seen as a great benefit by the school for Dave to facilitate this planning.

There was again considerable chaplaincy input to the S6 Students Conference in October with Dave doing most of the material planning. Feedback was all positive from both team and students as themes similar to previous years on the nature of belief were explored. Dave's Club continues to be well attended and valued. It meets at lunch-time on Fridays continuing throughout the year with a regular clientele of between fifteen and thirty students. It has been particularly encouraging this year to see a sizeable group of new S1s come along. A significant development has been the introduction of a prayer meeting (The 60 Second Club) at Wednesday break times begun at the request of some pupils.



Bibles were once again given to those S6 leavers who wished them after the End of Session ceremony.

Dave took part in the Staff v. Pupil football match in May and, in June, helped with the special needs trip to Aviemore. The school also asked Dave to go to Rome before the October holiday with the Art and RME departments to support the RME programme and as another adult leader. Some of the COOL staff development budget was used to finance this and the school were very appreciative of this extra help. These trips allow Dave to get alongside teenagers he may not otherwise have known.

#### *PRIMARY SCHOOLS*

Several schools received assemblies prior to the summer and all P7s were visited before the end of June and given the useful booklet, 'Its your Move' which helps them understand the transition from primary to secondary. This initiative is funded by COOL and individual donations, enabling every P7 to receive a book.

Since the start of the current session Dave has made contact with all eleven schools and assemblies have been booked up until Christmas in most of them. These help him become a known face to the primary children prior to their move to the High School and enable him to get to know them a little.

#### *CHURCHES*

All the parishes took part in the prayer for youth events planned by COOL, both in May and in November. These were much

appreciated and gave an opportunity for discussion about the local youth work. Dave continues to provide support for local youth groups throughout the area being involved in the leadership of SoundWaves in Broadford and occasional help in other youth fellowships. He has been invited to be the speaker at a planned weekend away for the Strath & Sleat A2J teen Bible group. He has also spoken at the YF in Lochcarron and attended the Glenelg and Kyleakin Youth Clubs.

In November Dave ran a training seminar for ministers throughout the local presbyteries involved in schools' ministry to update people on current legislation relating to religious observance in schools. This was developed in response to local needs but was then extended to include presbyteries of all local denominations. Three head teachers and ministers from several churches attended. The seminar was well received by all who attended, and a useful time of discussion followed.



#### *HOLIDAY CLUBS*

Holiday Clubs took place this summer in Glenelg, Elgol and Lochcarron with Dave having input of training and teaching

material to all three. The material entitled 'Mission Impossible?' was written from scratch based on the life of David with all three clubs contributing to the programme.

All were well attended, with around 50 children in Elgol to 65 in Glenelg. Whilst Dave helped in Glenelg he had overall responsibility for both Lochcarron and Elgol.

Glenelg and Lochcarron also had teenage programmes in the afternoons which attracted 40 young people between them. This has helped these areas further develop their youth programmes. The churches have expressed their appreciation for this input from COOL, recognising Dave's ability to enthuse and relate to youngsters from P1 to upper secondary and his professionalism in all he does.

#### *EVENTS*

The annual residential weekend at Alltnacriche, near Aviemore was in March and was Dave's first weekend back at work. Thirty-three young people came along from all our local groups with small groups also coming from Strathpeffer and Fort Augustus. Colin Carmichael of SU Scotland led this along with local leaders and Dave helped out in the kitchen. Much thanks is due to the whole team who worked together to make it a success in Dave's absence and to Colin without whom we may have had to cancel.

Friday Nights @ Dave and Ruths' has continued to grow and now routinely has ten young people attending from several different villages, from Skye to Lochcarron. In the summer term they looked at dramatic encounters with Jesus in the Old and New Testament and more recently have been studying the gospel of John. Although transport is often a difficulty, it's encouraging to see how many are able to get there each week.

Five senior students volunteered for the Vine Trust work party to Peru in July with Dave, to help improve the lives of homeless boys. Each student and Dave raised over £1500 to cover expenses and



contribute towards the work in Peru. They further paid for the highly recommended trip to Machu Picchu. The first week was a return for Dave to Kusi near Yungay, the village that SU Peru are building beneath Huascarán, Peru's highest mountain. They were able to see buildings now completed which had been begun by a previous team

from Plockton and to get on with their own tasks of adobe making and granite block shifting. Both were strenuous activities, especially when working at over 8000ft but it did give a great sense of achievement as the work progressed. They then went on to Urubamba in the Sacred Valley of the Incas where foundations were laid for a new workshop in which the boys would learn trades. During that week they visited Machu Picchu. It was a unique and moving experience for the students to be able to help in this way and to experience at first hand the warmth with which the children there accepted them despite their incredibly difficult lives.

Dave has attended regional staff training days and North Team

meetings during the year and has appreciated these opportunities for teaching, fellowship with others and discussions about the work, which contributes to his professional development. He has also led groups and prepared teaching material for use by others.

#### *CONCLUSION*

Throughout this year, in spite of the delayed start to Dave's involvement, we have been encouraged by the growth in many aspects of the work which we have seen take place and we have been encouraged by the support we receive from schools and churches, not only for the financial needs but also in prayer support and through the volunteers who help to facilitate the work. We continue to be grateful to Dave for his wise and conscientious approach to all he does.

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



This year's Annual Report marks the end of Dave's seventh year as COOL's Youth and Schools Worker. As always, I continue to be very grateful to everybody who has made and continues to make the youth worker project possible in the area. As a Christian, my thanks firstly goes to God, who has motivated so many people to provide and pray for the work. My appreciation then goes out to all those who have responded in this way, and to the many people who provide for COOL in other ways, giving of their time and skills to work as volunteers in the work among youth in their own areas, and to those who serve COOL in an administrative capacity. Without the volunteers and committee members, COOL would be unable to operate and Dave would not be able to do this work.

Dave continues to be a well known face in our catchment area, having the on going privilege of access to the High School and to most of the associated feeder primary schools. Once again I would like to thank all the head teachers and staff who make him so welcome. As Dave has known many of the young people for several years, he has been able to build up relationships with them, being seen as somebody that they can confide in. Many of the head teachers and other members of staff in the schools continue to express their appreciation for Dave's input.

Outside the schools, many voluntary youth workers continue to receive assistance, encouragement and training, as required, from Dave while they seek to develop the work in their own areas. There is always a need for more adults to offer their time and expertise to assist and lead young people's work locally. The voluntary youth workers and helpers in the various areas are often very busy and over stretched, as the additional help required is not always forthcoming, and the ability to fulfil some of the objectives in last year's Annual Report has not been possible.



Another overseas trip was made available to senior pupils in the High School, when a group of young people (including a recent school leaver) went once again to Peru as part of a working party with the Vine Trust. COOL is not anticipating an overseas trip in summer 2009. COOL has also been encouraged to see some of the pupils at Plockton High School joining in prayer for their own school on a regular basis.

The unexpected death of Dave's father at the beginning of COOL's current year was a contributory factor leading to the

need for Dave to take time out. COOL expressed their sympathy to Dave and his family at that difficult time. During this period there was reflection of Dave's work load and pastoral care. In his absence work by the local ministers continued in the schools. The other major event planned to take place during this period was the residential weekend at Alltnacriche, and this was able to go ahead under Colin Carmichael's leadership, with the help of other volunteers. I am very grateful to Colin (one of Scripture Union Scotland's regional workers) and the volunteers who made this possible, and also to Dave who returned to work at about this time, assisting in the kitchen. I continue to meet with Dave on a monthly basis whenever possible, to discuss and pray over the work, and issues arising there from.

All work of this type has its times of encouragements, as well as discouragements, and I wish to record my thanks to Dave for his ongoing and devoted work for the trust. My thanks also go to Dave's wife Ruth, for her on going support, and the use of their home for some young people's meetings. I am also grateful for the support given by many of the local church ministers, who continue to meet with Dave regularly for times of discussion, prayer and fellowship with Dave, as they seek to work for the together for the Kingdom of God in our catchment area.

The work of COOL is only possible due to the ongoing work of those dedicated persons who make up the Management Committee, which is authorised by the trustees to undertake the day to day

running of the trust. This committee provides the necessary administrative, general financial and other oversight of the project. I wish to thank all those who give of their time and energy in this way and seek to ensure that the trust is run correctly within the OSCR guidelines and child protection legislation. I am also grateful to the other trustees for their support and general oversight of the work.

Two sub committees specifically oversee the financial affairs and fund raising activities of COOL, and I continue to be thankful for all the work these sub committee members put into this work. Financially, the trust has continued to receive faithful and generous donations from many individual supporters from the local area, and a few from further afield. Five of the local church congregations in our catchment area continue to support the work on a regular basis. The financial support from all these sources has continued at a similar level to the previous year, and met about 85% of our financial needs. We are tremendously thankful for the continued generosity of the many individuals, and the local church congregations, who give to the work regularly. The final £2,000 of the grant allocated to us from the Church of Scotland Parish Development Fund was received during the year, and has contributed to our finances, and we have been very grateful for their support. We have also been grateful for support from the Co-op Community Fund, for a grant towards purchasing a new laptop computer for the work, and also to the Lloyds TSB Foundation

for their support in the past. Our total expenditure exceeded our income, and hence the financial balances held by COOL diminished during the year. This emphasises that there is an on going need for even more giving locally. The trust is still hopeful that through increased personal giving, additional giving from local church congregations, together with some of the other local church congregations who do not support us regularly at present and some new fund raising initiatives, that the project can be self sustaining financially. If you are able to help support the work of COOL in this way, or are able to review your annual giving bearing in mind inflationary pressures etc., the treasurer (or any other Management Committee member) would very much like to hear from you. They can provide you with the necessary information.



COOL has maintained its status as part of the Scripture Union Scotland (SUS) Associated Worker Scheme. We value their support and expertise in many different aspects of the work. Colin

Carmichael keeps close contact with the Trust, attending Management Committee meetings and planning meetings when possible. He also meets up with Dave, offering support as appropriate. I really value this input plus the much driving that Colin has to do to achieve this. I continue to be a regular attendee at the Associate Worker Group committee

meetings in Glasgow, contributing to the running of the nationwide scheme, and in particular highlighting the needs of the more rural Associate Worker Trusts.

#### PERSONNEL

The Management Committee has seen two members step down during the year. As indicated in last year's report, Jill Clayton retired from the Management Committee and the Trustees during the year. Jill has served on both bodies from the inception of the Trust, and I am very thankful to Jill for the great deal of time that she has put into the setting up, and running of the trust over the years. As Dave put it to me, COOL would probably not be where it is today without Jill's tremendous input. Alison Angus has taken on the responsibility of trustee in Jill's place, and has agreed to be the secretary to the trustees. Fiona Talbot has kindly agreed to become the minute secretary to the Management Committee, and Moira Lane has agreed to deal with general correspondence. Various other committee members have taken on additional responsibilities. I wish to thank all those who have taken on these additional roles and responsibilities. Charles Clark also stood down from the Management Committee during the year for personal and family reasons, and I wish to thank him for his contribution to the work of COOL.

Thank you to all those who pray regularly for the Management Committee, and we continue to seek your on going prayers for the committee, and for new members to join the committee.

## **OBJECTIVES FOR THE COMING YEAR**

### *TO ARRANGE JOINT YOUTH FELLOWSHIPS*

There are a number of Youth Fellowships in the area, but each have just a few attending, so it was felt that a joint meeting once a term would encourage our church young people in their faith.

### *TO ORGANISE A QUESTIONNAIRE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE*

It has been difficult to try to involve young people in the COOL management and decision making process so a group from the Management Committee will produce a targeted questionnaire which Dave can then give out to some of the young people to gauge what they would like to see happen or be involved in.

## *SUMMER HOLIDAY CLUBS*

We will continue this year to work with and train local parishes to become self-sufficient in running childrens' holiday clubs.

### *TO LOOK AT FINANCES*

So far we have not been able to become self-financing. This year the committee will look at raising further support locally from the churches by sending out letters asking them to either consider increasing their current support or to start supporting COOL if they don't already do so. If responses are not forthcoming then further grants and awards from external bodies will be sought.

## REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER

I report on the accounts of the charity for the financial year ended 30 November 2008 as set out on pages 12 to 14.

### *RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES AND EXAMINER*

NOTES ON THE ACCOUNTS

- 1 A new desktop computer for COOL was purchased at a cost of £1,705. A gift-aided donation of £1,000 was received towards this, which with the gift aid relief covered £1,280 of the overall cost. A baking stall run as a fund raising activity for this computer purchase brought in a further £96.
- 2 The Co-op made a grant of £500 towards the purchase of a new laptop computer, which cost £573.
- 3 The following activities were undertaken during the year in connection with COOL's charitable objectives and there was a shortfall of £525 on the Alltnacriche weekends.

- 4 At the start of the financial year there was a total of £2,891 in the Peru Fund. A total of £4,108 was raised for this year's Peru trip from participants' payments, fund raising activities and donations. The actual expenditure for the trip during this financial year amounted to £6,117. After the trip, the Peru Fund balance stood at £883 and £850 was transferred to the CAF Gold account in order to maximise interest on these funds since no Peru trip will take place in 2009.
- 5 The Management Committee agreed during the year that henceforth mileage undertaken by the Youth Worker in attending SU training days will be charged against Staff Development not the Youth Worker Travel budget. Hence this year, the expenditure for travel is lower and that for staff development higher when compared to previous year's figures.
- 6 The expenditure in the other sundries category relates to miscellaneous activities such as the COOL Annual Celebration and this year amounted to £278. This total was made up of £100 travelling expenses for our guest speaker at the Annual Celebration, £50 for the hire of Dornie Hall for the 'Back to School with God' event and £128 in fees for amending legal documentation due to the change in COOL trustees.
- 7 The shortfalls on special events (see note 3 for details) and the distribution of books and bibles to school leavers (shortfall £135) resulted in a total of £660 effectively being transferred from unrestricted funds to cover the deficits in restricted funds.

## OVERSIGHT OF COOL

### TRUSTEES
